#### Introduction

We are pleased to share the results of the 2022-2023 Teaching, Research and International Policy (TRIP) Faculty Survey, fielded with the support of the Carnegie Corporation of New York.

## Methodology

We attempted to contact all international relations (IR) scholars in the United States. We define IR scholars as individuals who are employed at a college or university in a political science department or professional school and who teach or conduct research on issues that cross international borders. Of the 5,356 scholars across the United States that we contacted, 979 responded to at least one question. The resulting response rate is approximately 18.3 percent. The survey was open from October 13, 2022 to January 17, 2023.
