



# TRIP Snap Poll 16 Report

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## Introduction

We are pleased to share the results of the 16th Teaching, Research and International Policy (TRIP) Snap Poll, fielded in collaboration with the Sié Center for International Security and Diplomacy at the University of Denver's Josef Korbel School of International Studies, and with the support of the Carnegie Corporation of New York. Our polls provide real-time data in the wake of significant policy proposals, during international crises, and on emerging foreign policy debates.

## Methodology

We attempted to contact all international relations (IR) scholars in the United States. We define IR scholars as individuals who are employed at a college or university in a political science department or professional school and who teach or conduct research on issues that cross international borders. Of the 4,798 scholars across the United States that we contacted, 760 responded to at least one question. The resulting response rate is approximately 16 percent. The poll was open from December 16 of 2021 to January 31 of 2022. Our sample is roughly similar to the broader population of International Relations scholars in terms of gender, academic rank, and university type.
